

Jim Windeyer has written a book, will speak about his great aunt, **Margaret Windeyer (1866-1939)**, who was a member of the Tomago Branch of the family. In the movement to improve the status of women, at the end of the 1800s Margaret was prominent, persuasive and active. She was present at the meeting that produced the **Womanhood Suffrage League** and on its Council: called the meeting from which the **National Council of Women of NSW** emerged; and was a Commissioner for NSW at the 1893 Columbian Exposition (World Fair) and the Congress of Representative Women in Chicago. Jim has written a book that covers these areas as well as her career as a librarian in the Mitchell Library in Sydney.

William the brother of John Raymond, first enlisted in July 1915, but his eldest sister Myra protested to the Army Authorities and William was sent home. Determined to enlist, William obtained his Grandfather's permission and re-enlisted. He survived just over 12 months. One Some of the things that they learnt were

- "just look and don't touch" this was their instruction from their teachers and the children showed great restraint, and excellent behaviour in following this message – there are so many tempting things to touch, but they understood the importance of not touching the exhibits. Well done!
- the way of life in the past times was very different to the way that they live today, and we are lucky that we don't have to work as hard as people used to have to work.

They were amazed at the kitchen items, and the way that washing had to be done, without a washing machine.

It was a pleasure to have a visit from such an enthusiastic and well-mannered group of pre schoolers and their understanding carers. A good morning was had by all.



The National Debt in England started in 1693 when William III borrowed £1 million at an interest rate of 10% to fund his war with France.

In the 15th century, Sumptuary Laws restricted the poorer classes of people from spending money on certain items. For instance, they were not allowed to wear wide sleeves, or coloured or patterned clothing.

THEY ANSWERED THE CALL! - Moira Saunderson

Well over two hundred men from the Raymond Terrace area enlisted to fight in WW1. The majority were not skilled, falling mainly into the category of Farmer or farm labourer. They were honest hardworking men with the many skills they possessed, being gleaned from having to make do and improvise in a climate where nothing came free.

For the local families who proudly offered their sons to defend their country for the British Empire, of which Australia was still a part, the war became an intensely personal one. A casualty of a loved one not only became that of a son, brother or husband, but also a neighbour, the lad who worked in the local store, a football or school mate or a good friend.

From the town of Raymond Terrace to the immediate surrounding areas of Medowie, Millers Forest, Seaham and Williamtown eighteen WW1 memorials have been erected.

Lest We Forget.

Twenty three local men are listed on the Raymond Terrace Memorial as paying the supreme sacrifice, however one name, that of Herbert Hamilton, is missing, and Lt. Dorney is not listed as a casualty.
